Resting peacefully at the end of the road at 8,885 feet in elevation, Crested Butte has been many things to many people. First, it was the Ute tribes who inhabited this rugged landscape. Crested Butte was incorporated as a town in 1880 upon the discovery of extensive coal deposits. After its early mining days, CB transitioned to outdoor tourism, and has evolved into a refuge for artists and wanderers alike.

People come to Crested Butte and say, "There's something magical about this place." They are right. Referred to as "The Gateway of the Elk Mountains" and "The Wildflower Capital of Colorado," there is no shortage of ways to get lost (or found) here.

Crested Butte was certified as a Creative District in the summer of 2016, with the goal to serve and support creatives so art can enrich our town. Creativity blossoms like the wildflowers here. The town is packed with public art installations, galleries, arts organizations, and artisan makers of metalwork, jewelry, skis and even rum. Selfexpression is encouraged here. As you walk the streets of our historic district, you may see painters working en plein air, dancers, filmmakers, photographers, or people dressed in costumes for one of our many public events.

Getting Around Crested Butte

The town of Crested Butte has excellent and FREE public transportation.

The Crested Butte Mountain Express Shuttle loops through Crested Butte and Mount Crested Butte with stops at Old Town Hall, 6th and Belleview, the 4-Way Stop and Teocalli; then proceeds to Mount Crested Butte, where it stops at Wood Creek/ Mountain Edge, The Plaza and Mountaineer Square. On its scheduled departure for Crested Butte, it has stops at Three Seasons/Outrun, Mountain Sunrise, Chateaux and Pitchfork. Bike racks are available on the shuttle.

The Gunnison Valley RTA Free Bus runs a loop between Mount Crested Butte, Crested Butte, and the City of Gunnison via Hwy 135.

Driving and parking your vehicle


• Please walk, bike or ride the free bus when possible, as parking in Crested Butte is limited.

• Refrain from parking on Seventh Street and the adjacent neighborhood Please be courteous to our neighbors by parking near the 4-Way Stop at 6th Street and Elk Avenue, a leisurely four-minute walk away from the Center.

• Additional parking is available at the Crested Butte Community School, located at 818 Red Lady Avenue.

• Please do not park in the driveway parallel to Sixth Street on the west side of the Center; this is a fire lane and is for pick-up/drop-off and loading only.

CENTER FOR THE ARTS EVENT PARKING




Handicapped Parking



Governor's Creative Leadership Awards Luncheon

Colorado Creative Industries is proud to play a role in celebrating excellence in creative industries across the state. Each year, during the Creative Industries Summit, Creative Leadership Awards are presented to community members that have demonstrated a significant commitment to Colorado's creative landscape through civic leadership and volunteerism including advocacy, vision, collaboration, or innovation.





2023 Award Design by Anders Johnson (Gunnison)

Anders Johnson grew up in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He found his way to Colorado through a teaching position at Western Colorado University in Gunnison, where he is now an Associate Professor of Art. Johnson received his BA from North Park University in Chicago and holds an MFA in Painting and Drawing from Indiana University.

Johnson has an active national and international exhibition record of solo and group shows. As a painter, he creates environments that are both filled with ruin and disarray, but also contain a careful assemblage of cultural, historical, political, and personal references. His recent work revolves around a fictionalization of the Colorado landscape, particularly the Western Slope. Unlike traditional landscape painting, these works are purposefully driven by an imagined narrative. They can look fantastical, playful, dystopian, and sometimes downright surreal. Using the motif of the landscape, his paintings attempt to tell a story about present-day America by referencing its past, anticipating its future, and painting those messy and beautiful moments that give it vitality.





2023 Award Recipients Ed Dwight

Lifetime of Achievement Award– Presented to sculptor Ed Dwight for a lifetime of achievement and significant contribution to arts and culture through the creation of monumental artworks commemorating African American leadership and legacy. His unwavering dedication to his craft and his artistic vision have amplified African American achievement both regionally and nationally. His list of accomplishments have been a source of inspiration and pride for many, and have left an indelible mark on Colorado.

Ed Dwight has been passionate about art since his youth. He is a graduate engineer, a former USAF Test Pilot and America's first African American Astronaut candidate. After successful careers in the Air Force, IBM Systems Engineer, restaurateur, aviation consultant, real estate and construction entrepreneur, Ed has dedicated the last 43 years solely to his artistic endeavors.

In 1974, George Brown, Colorado's first black lieutenant governor, chose Ed to create a bronze bust of him to display in the Colorado State Capitol. Being a neophyte to bronze sculpting, Ed enrolled at the University of Denver in the Masters of Fine Arts Program, where he became proficient in metal casting and received his MFA. In 1975, Ed was commissioned by the Colorado Centennial Commission to create a series of bronzes depicting the contribution of Blacks to the American Frontier West, which was exhibited throughout the United States. In 1979, the National Park Service encouraged Ed to create a bronze series portraying the history and historical roots of Jazz. The series was created and entitled "JAZZ: An American Art Form," and consists of over 70 bronzes depicting the evolution of Jazz from its African roots to the fusion of contemporary music. Ed's first large-scale commissioned work was for the National Park Service of the abolitionist Frederick Douglass and is on display at the Douglass Museum in Anacostia, Maryland. Since this commission, Ed has completed over 130 large scale commissioned installations throughout the United States and Canada. In addition, he has created over 18,000 gallery level sculptures sold throughout the world.

Ed is the recipient of enumerable "Living Legends Awards" from around the Country for his achievements in space activities and contributions in art and black history. Most recently, he was inducted and bestowed honorary membership in the newly created Space Force. Now, there is even an asteroid named after him. NASA has honored Ed by sending several of his bronze pieces on Space Missions. Ed Dwight is a true renaissance man!



2023 Award Recipients Ann Lukacs

Arts and Community Action Award– Presented to individuals that have demonstrated selfless service, inspired others to take action or catalyze change in their community using the arts.

Lukacs is an artist, photographer and cinematographer. She has been a resident of Park County for 16 years and Breckenridge 27 years prior to that. She was recently certified a Colorado Change Leader by Governor Jared Polis for exceptional community development efforts. As part of her certification, Ann created the Park County Creative Alliance, a 501(c)3 nonprofit arts alliance with the vision of "Uniting Park County Through The Arts".

Ann served on the Board of Arts For Colorado, a statewide non-profit advocacy network. Ann was appointed by Governor Roy Romer to serve on the Advisory Board of the Colorado Women's Economic Development Council from 1990-1995. She has been on the Board of several nonprofit organizations, including the Breckenridge Film Festival, Summit Historical Society and Women of the Summit.

By profession, Ann has had a long prestigious career in the film industry. She was one of the early female cinematographers and worked on many major feature films. She has been a strong advocate for the promotion of film and video opportunities in Colorado.

Ann currently owns the "Bucking Horse Gallery" in Fairplay that displays her photography and serves as the office for the Park County Creative Alliance where she continues to bring unique programming to local artists. Ann continues to be dedicated to preserving and advancing arts and culture in Colorado and especially in her community.





2023 Awar<mark>d Recip</mark> Michael Paglia

Arts and Creative Placemaking– Presented to individuals that use the arts to envision new futures through activities such as activating a public space, animating a community or sparking redevelopment.

Michael Paglia is a professional writer working as an art critic, curator, educator and script writer. During his nearly thirty-year-long writing career, he has focused on the art and architecture of the American West, and has gained specialized knowledge of the art scene in Colorado. His columns have appeared in Westword, a Denver weekly, since 1995. In that capacity, he covered the art explosion in the area that occurred over the last fifteen years. In addition to the landmark events that occurred during this very significant period for art in the area, notably the museum-building boom, Paglia also reviewed the work of hundreds of artists, many from Colorado, and he continues to do so.

Paglia's reviews, reports, essays and features on the visual arts and the built environment have also been published in regional and national periodicals including Art News, Architecture, Modernism, Art & Auction and Sculpture Magazine. Paglia was the Denver correspondent for, and a contributing editor to, Art Ltd., a Los Angeles-based art magazine.

Born in Philadelphia, Paglia has lived in Colorado since he was a child, attending the University of Colorado at Boulder where he earned both a B.A. and an M.A. Paglia taught at the Rocky Mountain College of Art and Design and is periodically a lecturer in art history at the University of Colorado Denver.

Paglia is a past recipient of a Society of Professional Journalists Award, and of the prestigious DAM Key Award from the Denver Art Museum for his contributions to the Colorado art world.



Arts and Social Change– Presented to individuals that work to solve a critical social problem such as homelessness, drug prevention, abuse, poverty or racism using creativity and/or arts.

Andrea's journey at Mirror Image Arts started in 2009 as an actor in their first play. In 2011, the founder Erin Jorgenson, handed the custodianship of the organization to Andrea. She says, "her heart was in her mouth." She had no idea what was in store for her, but she knew it was an opportunity of a lifetime.

Since then, Andrea has taken that opportunity and led Mirror Image Arts to become a dynamic youth advocacy organization in Denver, disrupting the school to prison pipeline through participatory theatre. In 2022, the organization facilitated 77 programs in partnership with schools, youth detention centers, and diversion programs.

Andrea's leadership has amplified youth voices that often go unheard. She was instrumental in helping to develop HB22-1373, which was signed into law by Governor Polis last year, prohibiting courts from ordering juveniles to pay restitution to insurance companies.

Braiding three voices in song, spoken word, and music for "Rematriation-Our Homecoming," this piece recognizes the desires of Indigenous people to have the ability to return to ancestral lands and is intended to offer a healing presence, not only to those who are with us today, but also extending to the ancestors.

Often, when long-time leaders retire, we give them a big party but fail to ask them what they have learned over their career – not to be nostalgic but to grasp big-picture ideas, trends and patterns that may be valuable to younger leaders. And, often, leaders in mid-career are so busy "doing" that they aren't afforded time to reflect on their work and the legacy they hope to build through their career. In this session, two senior leaders and two leaders in mid-career will engage in conversation about patterns they see and what they have learned – or are learning – that may be valuable to arts leaders at any point in their career.

Gunnison Valley Theater Festival

During the pandemic, Heather and Steve Hughes dreamed up what would become The Gunnison Valley Theatre Festival--a 501C3, professional outdoor festival that would allow people to come together and watch plays, all while maintaining the space they needed to feel safe. Now in its 3rd year, and with the addition of a youth theatre camp, as well as a whole lot of other theatrical offerings, the GVTF continues its mission of bringing meaningful, professional theatre to the Gunnison Valley- thankfully, with a little less panic than in its first year. The GVFT is proud to partner year-round with The Crested Butte Center for the Arts to present staged readings of beloved plays, both classic and contemporary.

Colorado's Evolving Arts & Culture Philanthropy; A Continuing Conversation to Share Progress, Ongoing Community Needs and Opportunities Presenters: Chris Bui, Gina Ferrari, Bryce Merrill, Claire Swinford

During the 2021 CCI Summit, arts and culture creators, administrators and funders engaged in an open conversation about the impact of COVID-19 on the creative sector, the role of arts in recovery and how arts philanthropy must change to support the sector. Since then, feedback has been top of mind for the Arts & Culture Funders Group, and positive shifts in practices have occurred. This session will briefly report on how arts philanthropy has progressed with actions taken and changes yet to come. Time for ongoing candid conversation will inform the continued evolution of philanthropy in service to the community.

Durango Creative District's Implementation of Lodgers' Tax Arts and Culture Fund

Presenters: Tommy Crosby, Kathryn Waggener Location: Schaul Children's Music Room

In April 2021, Durango voters approved increasing Lodgers' Tax, a tax on commercial lodging facilities such as hotels when a room is rented, from 2% to 5.25%. Voters then approved 14% of the revenue from this tax to go towards Arts and Culture, creating the Lodgers' Tax Arts and Culture Fund, which provides \$500,000 to go towards Durango's creative economy annually. The Durango Creative District, a non-profit organization and city contractor, collaborated with the Creative Economy Commission, a branch of City Government, to create and distribute an application for projects. This presentation details the types of projects funded, troubleshooting along the way, and how we have collaboratively built professional development programs in conjunction with the fund to ensure long term economic vitality for the creative sector in Durango.

The Mechanics of Sustaining a Creative Life Presenter: Sharon Louden Supported by BreckCreate Location: Hawk Art Studio

This workshop for artists will dive into the details of real-life strategies that every artist can focus on to help them sustain their creative practices into the future. Topics will include: Goal Setting • Identifying and researching your audience • Building an amazing database • How to approach members of your community with whom you wish to dialogue • Creating your own opportunities • Community Building • Understanding the gallery/artist relationship • Intelligent correspondence habits • Reaching life goalsand more.

What Greets You at the Airport: Creative Industries, Tourism and Authenticity

This workshop examines efforts to establish positive links between creative industry and tourism. There are numerous examples of such successful partnerships in Colorado, and many more examples of ones that did no go so well. After a brief discussion, the workshop will provide a "hands-on" opportunity to try out some new ideas pertaining to the relationship between creative industry and tourism. At the heart of the workshop will be a particular focus on how a sense of authenticity affects the relationship.

Crested Butte became a registered National Historic District in 1974 to preserve our distinctive buildings from the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Join us on an Elk Avenue Walking Tour to learn about the history of the buildings, mining history, and stories from the community from long time local Gloria Cunningham. The tour begins at the Crested Butte Museum and will last 1.5 hours.

Documentary Film Screening

Ute Bear Dance Then And Now

Presenters: Daniel Cesspooch, Jim Ciletti, James Foguth, Regina Lopez-Whiteskunk, Bernadette Salem

Location: The Majestic Theater, 507 Red Lady Avenue

This double-feature will offer two mini-documentaries capturing the spirit of the Ute Bear Dance in 1988 and again in 2022 (with many of the same musicians and dancers featured in both versions!). In 1988, poet and filmmaker Jim Ciletti documented the Ute Bear Dance at White Mesa Utah, and in 2022, documentary filmmakers James Foguth and Bernadette Salem brought together indigenous musicians and singers to collaborate and document the Bear Dance once again at the same location. The Bear Dance signifies the change of seasons and the awakening of land and animals from cold winter months. The 2022 Bear Dance signifies the re-emergence of the ceremony, which had not been held for over two years during the pandemic. The documentary hears from the panelists including Ute Mountain Ute Regina Lopez-Whiteskunk, who is featured first in the documentaries as a young teen and then again as a grandmother speaking on topics including the importance of passing on Ute traditions to her grandchildren.



Art Cartopia

Trinidad, Colorado is home to a "Neo-Roadside Attraction" that features 35+ art cars in their magnificently wacky collection. This explosion of creative energy is one of only 3 art car museums in America; it is the largest and most visited. Open year round, Art Cartopia serves not only as a tourist attraction, but is the driving force behind the annual ArtoCade Art Car Festival and parade. Both the festival and the museum are nationally known and their popularity is exploding. The museum and festival have art cars created by kids, quilters, Christians, cops and convicts.

Art Cartopia is home to an art gallery, two maker-spaces, ongoing arts education programs as well as a wondrous array of special events and activities. There is the annual ArtoCade Bowl (fundraiser/party), Trash-N-Fashion (recycled materials runway fashion show), and Art Carnage (remote control mini-art car demolition derby). The museum space also serves as a venue for music performances. It is used by other organizations for seminars, meetings, presentations and various other group activities.

Art Cars featured in this year's CCI Summit: "Karmadillo"

Created in 2019 under the tutelage of Rebecca Bass from Houston, Texas. Ms. Bass is the most prolific art car artist in the world and internationally revered teacher for her work with urban, under-served, low-income high school students. Rebecca came to Trinidad to facilitate the creation of Karmadillo, which was created with the assistance of our local people. Karmadillo was made by 7 kids, 7 adults in just 7 days. That is astounding, even by our wacky standards!

"Spellbound"

This is the newest art car in the Art Cartopia collection, created during the very challenging year of 2020. Along a very non-linear series of happenstance, we hatched the idea of covering it with Scrabble tiles. Under normal non-COVID circumstances, we would have hosted poetry slams, scrabble competitions, and other group activities to create content for the project. Since that was not an option, we went digital. We had people of all ages write haikus and poems along with lists of favorite (and least favorite) words, car puns and related quotable quotes. This process attracted over 200 helpers from near and far - schools and senior centers in 5 states and globally via Facebook. After choosing from the amazing flood of contributions, we had "quaranteams" (groups of family, friends, and COVID bubbles) use those words to cover the vehicle with over 13,000 scrabble tiles.

This session presents three case studies from across Colorado that demonstrate the therapeutic impacts of the arts. Licensed Professional Counselor and Registered Board Certified Art Therapist, Joni, Beckner has worked for over 20 years in the Grand Junction community using art therapy with children, adolescents and adults. She will share the impact of the arts as a therapeutic tool in her work in multiple settings, including hospice and palliative care, psychosocial rehabilitation for chronically mentally ill adults, and in private practice. Pueblo artist, Matte Refic, will share lessons learned facilitating public art projects and teaching in high security prisons, including the "Super Max" Federal Corrections Complex in Florence. Finally, partners in the Colorado Resiliency Arts Lab (CORAL) will discuss the outcomes and methodologies of this collaboration, which is committed to enhancing healthcare professionals' well-being and alleviating psychological stress. This NEA-supported research project has been studying the impact of arts interventions in addressing this problem.

Fund Your Passion, Fuel Your Dreams: Getting Creative with Funding

With minibreakout sessions on each topic, you'll work with content experts and your peers to develop ideas and get hands-on feedback for funding.

These quick and interesting presentations will keep you engaged as members of the Crested Butte community share their Creative Placemaking efforts. Creative Placemaking uses arts and culture to strategically shape a place's physical and social character to spur economic development, promote social change and improve the physical environment. Come ready to experience the creative funk of CB and leave feeling inspired to creatively impact your community.

Transforming Community: Celebrating Our Stories and Spirit of Place will focus on Crested Butte's 38-year Fall Harvest Celebration, Vinotok, as the central example of using Cultural Animation to help communities revisit, re-examine and reclaim the stories of their past and place in order to celebrate and re-envision their future in an inclusive manner. We will watch Marcie Telander's 18-minute TEDX Talk of the same name and discuss similar projects Mark & Marcie have designed in places ranging from ethnicallymixed inner cities, to culturally and environmentally challenged communities facing economic turmoil, to First Nation Tribes. The remainder of the session will be opened to questions in order to help participants identify how best to apply this process to their specific interests and needs.

Creating a Shared Arts Advocacy Platform for Colorado Presenters: Meredith Badler, Christin Crampton Day Location: Schaul Children's Music Room

Through a coordinated statewide advocacy effort, CBCA is working to ensure that arts, culture and the creative industries are valued and supported by policymakers and voters, resulting in economically vibrant, healthy, and equitable communities throughout our state. CBCA is beginning the process to get inclusive input into this platform from communities across the state. From Access to Aging Presented by Damon McLeese With support from Gunnison Valley Health Foundation

What will the cultural landscape look like in the next 20 years? For decades we have devoted our energies and resources to creative programming and access to our youth. What happens when there are more 60 year olds than 6 year olds in this country? Combining lessons learned from 40 years of working in and around the disability community and accessibility modifications, I have learned a bit about the difference between creativity and artistry; and as I reached the milestone of being "old" myself, I realized that with an aging population there are also huge opportunities. We should be providing as many creative opportunities for 80 year olds as we do for 8 year olds. Study after study has shown people engaged in creative outlets live longer, take fewer medicines and are less likely to fall than their peers who do not. Also, as people continue to live longer, there is opportunity to expand our educational programs to think past traditional passive approaches for our elders and really embrace the creative spark that reemerges as we age. This is truly a talk about opportunity, rather than limitations, for individuals, organizations and society.

...Crested Butte School of Dance

Crested Butte School of Dance is a registered 501C3 nonprofit arts education organization providing opportunities for access to dance classes and performances. We create a nurturing environment for our youngest exploring artists and intensive instruction for serious students, both on the ground with traditional dance training and in the air with aerial fabric training. Our students take their dance education with them as they move into their maturing roles in life with character, self-esteem, and a level of discipline and focus that empowers them in their 21st century pursuits.

... The Crested Butte Song

Local music teacher, Amanda Cook, felt Crested Butte needed a song to celebrate the town's uniqueness; so in the spring of 2022, Ms. Cook collaborated with the 4th grade (class of 2030) to create The Crested Butte Song. Whether you are an arts organization or an individual creative, it is important that your marketing represents your authentic commitment to diversity, equity & inclusion. In this interactive session, we'll guide you through best (and worst) practices and wrestle together with tricky issues in marketing with a DEI lens.

Rural Arts Connect: Harnessing the Power of a Network Presenter: Teresa Booth Brown

In this summit session, we'll share the outcomes from Rural Arts Connect, a three-year research project by the Aspen Art Museum and the Center of Science and Industry's Center for Research and Evaluation, funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services. The project aimed to study what happens when rural arts organizations come together, share ideas, and develop collaborative programming. To achieve this, we formed a network of leaders from organizations across western Colorado with the shared goal of learning together and expanding capacity.

We'll discuss the challenges and successes of the project, consider possibilities for expanding this model, and explore how the future of networks like these could look. Under Jenny's leadership, Gunnison Valley Health launched a Department of Behavioral Health in 2021 and completed a comprehensive Behavioral Health Needs Assessment for Gunnison County. Currently, the Foundation is completing a \$12M capital campaign for a new EMS/Paramedics station with groundbreaking taking place in the Fall 2023.

Claire Swinford, Executive Director, Bee Vradenburg Foundation, she/her


